FAREWELL FOR NOW

PAINTING FROM THE HAGGIN COLLECTION SET TO BE ON LOAN



The Haggin was presented a rare opportunity to loan one of its paintings to an upcoming exhibition at a fellow institution. Les Desguises by Marie Laurencin will be on loan to the Barnes in Philadelphia, PA. Marie Laurencin: Sapphic Paris, organized by the Barnes and curated by Cindy Kang, curator at the Barnes, and Simonetta Fraquelli, consultant curator, will be on view between October 22, 2023 to January 21, 2024.

On view in the Roberts Gallery, this exhibition explores Laurencin's career, from her selfportraits to her collaborative decorative projects; from her early cubist paintings to her signature work—feminine and discreetly queer—that defined 1920s Paris. Presenting more than 50 works by Laurencin, it examines how her visualization of a "Sapphic modernity" subtly but radically challenges existing narratives of modern European art.

Les Desguises, displayed in the Haggin's McKee Gallery, will be on loan to the Barnes through the run of the exhibition and will return to the Haggin shortly after. A truly exciting opportunity for the Haggin!









YARDLEY'S PEOPLE, **PLACES, & THINGS**

ON VIEW FALL 2023

or over 50 years Ralph O. Yardley (1878 – 1961) captured the mood of his times in his illustrations and cartoons. He worked for many newspapers and publications such as the San Francisco Examiner, the San Francisco Chronicle, Honolulu's Pacific Commercial Advertiser, the San Francisco Bulletin, the New York Globe, and the San Francisco Call. In 1922 he returned to Stockton and spent three decades at the Stockton Record as its resident artist.

Yardley's daily editorial cartoons dealt with the topical issues of the day and his artwork decorated the paper's many special features, advertising supplements and holiday issues. One of his most popular contributions to the Record was his "Do You Remember" series, which he initiated in November of 1924. Published every Monday, these pen and ink sketches based upon old photographs and the artist's own memories recalled Stockton's past.

Yardley's People, Places & Things showcases illustrations from the Haggin Museum's collection which includes over 1,100 original works donated by the Record in 1970. This collection of images gives viewers a highly detailed glimpse into Stockton's bygone era—often with humorous touches so characteristic of the artist. They serve as a wonderful visual history of Stockton and reflect the love that Yardley had for his hometown.





FROM THE ARCHIVES

A GLIMPSE INTO STOCKTON'S PAST

On your next visit to the Haggin, you may notice a new gallery space dedicated to sharing collective stories of Stockton's past. Main Street Gallery, located just outside the Native American Gallery, between the Storefronts and the Museum Store, features historical images selected from the Haggin Museum's archives.

While not a comprehensive survey of the city of Stockton, this selection of images represents some of the businesses and individuals that helped shape Stockton into the city it is today. Ranging from the late-1800s to 1930s, these photographs capture the essence of Stockton's past, from its early beginnings as a small agricultural town to its growth into a thriving community.

UNDER PRESSURE PAINTING WITH AIR

A SURVEY OF CONTEMPORARY AIRBRUSH REALISM

NOVEMBER 16, 2023 - JANUARY 14, 2024

Under Pressure—Painting with Air (A Survey of Contemporary Airbrush Realism) is comprised of over 40 works, wideranging in theme, by noteworthy, working artists who have chosen airbrush as their principle medium of expression. According to the exhibit's Curator, David J. Wagner, Under Pressure—Painting with Air has been a long time coming: "The earliest, and perhaps the last exhibition to broadly survey airbrushed fine art that I am aware of was The Artist and The Airbrush, curated by Barbara Rogers, herself an accomplished artist, 40 years ago at The Art Department of San Jose State University in California where she served on the faculty." Two of the artists whose work was featured in that seminal exhibition have current work in Under Pressure—Don Eddy (b. 1944) and Jerry Ott (b. 1947)—as does another, George Green (1943-2020). This exhibition is comprised of works by these artists and those who followed in their footsteps including several of today's younger generation of accomplished airbrush masters.

Airbrush as a medium may be known to most people as a go-to medium for commercial artists who decorate a broad range of material culture beyond fine art, such as



t-shirts, sporting equipment and vehicles ranging from boats to pickup trucks, semis, cars and motorcycles, etc. In the 1950s and 60s, it became a go-to medium for the so-called Kustom Kulture, a neologism that refers to styles and fashions associated with custom cars and motorcycles in the United States particularly the hot rod culture of Southern California. Then there is animation, the culinary arts, body art, makeup, and tattoos. You name it, and airbrush artists seem to have covered it in one form or another.

Though a popular medium in the world of commercial art today, airbrush is actually a nineteenth-century invention. Francis Stanley, who with his twin brother, became famous for the Stanley Steamer, patented a simple "atomizer" airbrush to colorize photographs in 1876. An instrument called the "paint distributor," which relied on a hand-operated compressor to supply continuous air, was developed in 1879 by Abner Peeler "for the painting of watercolors and other artistic purposes." A commercial prototype was developed by Liberty Walkup who re-patented it under a name suggested by his wife Phoebe: "air-brush." She would go on to found the Illinois Art School in Rockford where airbrushing would be taught. Seventy-five miles north and a decade later, Charles Burdick revolutionized the air brush in Madison, Wisconsin. Patented in 1892, his airbrush was a doubleaction, internal-mix airbrush similar to those used today. It contained paint somewhat like a fountain pen, and featured an index finger trigger with the air supply re-positioned through the bottom, which improved balance and control. Burdick's invention was promoted by Thayer and Chandler, a Chicago mail order arts and crafts retailer, who also showcased it at the 1892 World Columbian Exposition. As other improvements ensued the medium took off. Today, airbrushes are used for countless commercial applications, as well as fine art.


In the world of fine art, Man Ray (1890–1977), remembered to many as a force of the Dada and Surrealism art movements, was among the first to employ airbrush in the production of fine art. Alberto Vargas (1896–1992), the pioneering artist who had emigrated from Peru to the U.S. after studying art in Europe, used airbrush in combination with watercolors, to produce his signature pin-ups,

which associated airbrush with this particular subject matter, a trend still visible today. With the emergence of Photorealism in the mid and late 1960s, the airbrush assumed a special place of distinction as a favorite medium among the first generation of artists practicing that style in America, e.g. Paul Sarkisian (1928-2019) and Ben Schonzeit (b. 1942). Interestingly, this phenomenon hasn't just been male dominated. In addition to Barbara Rogers (b. 1937), Audrey Flack (b. 1931), for example, projected images onto canvas instead of making preliminary drawings, and developed a method of applying paint in layers with an airbrush. After the first wave of Photorealists in the '60s and '70s, younger artists produced work that extended the medium of airbrush in new and interesting ways, notably, in the stylistic realm of what has become known as, Hyperrealism. Today, work by artists who use airbrush embodies a diverse range of style, subject matter, and technique.

Of the artists exhibiting in *Under Pressure*, Southerner, Dru Blair, is widely known as much for his art as he is an educator having founded his Blair School of Art in the '90s in Raleigh, NC which he operates today in Charleston. To demonstrate his impact, examples of work by several former students now having their own successful careers

are also featured: Silvia Belviso, David Evanoff, and Joshua Zarambo. In addition to this younger generation, and the older masters previously mentioned—Don Eddy, George Green, and Jerry Ott—others exhibiting, include some of the very best who have ever worked with the medium: Bruce Evans, Kirk Lybecker, Alan Pastrana, Cesar Santander, and Hisaya Taira. This exhibition features a diverse selection of works by each of these artists to share with viewers the breadth and depth of each artist's oeuvre and their artistic prowess. As such, the exhibit is a celebration of artistic virtuosity and achievement through a unique, American medium: airbrush.
