HAGGIN IS A BLUE STAR MUSEUM

Between Armed Forces Day, May 20, and Labor Day, September 4, the Haggin Museum is offering free admission to active-duty military personnel, including the National Guard and Reserves, and their families. On average, more than 2,000 museums participate, including nature centers, zoos, and children's museums.

museums, that becomes your territory, and that's a very rich territory," she continued.

For more than a decade, the Blue Star Museums program has offered active-duty military personnel and their families free admission to participating museums during summer months. It is a partnership between Blue Star Families and the National Endowment for the Arts, in collaboration with the Department of Defense and museums across America.



When creating Blue Star Museums, Kathy Roth-Douquet, founder and CEO of Blue Star Families, was inspired by her own experience as a military spouse, raising two children during frequent moves abroad and across the country. "Wherever we would move, one of the first things we would do would be to find the local museums and go to them," said Roth-Douquet. "Visiting museums gives you a sense of 'I belong here.' If you come into a community and your habit is to go to the

ARTIST HIGHLIGHT

RENÉ DE SAINT-MARCEAUX

French, 1845-1920

René de Saint-Marceaux was born in Reims, northeast of Paris, the son of a champagne maker and the grandson of the city's mayor. He entered the Ecole des Beaux-Arts in Paris in the early 1860s and studied under the sculptor François Jouffroy. In Jouffroy's studio, it is likely that Saint-Marceaux met another aspiring artist, the American Augustus Saint-Gaudens, who worked under Jouffroy from 1867-1870. The 1868 Salon committee accepted Saint-Marceaux's sculpture of *The Youth of Dante*; he would continue to show at the Salon throughout his career.

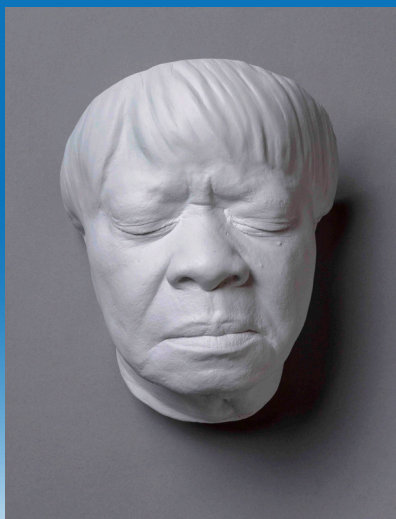
Saint-Marceaux exhibited a terracotta bust of a child at the Salon of 1874 that the portraitist—and teacher of John Singer Sargent—Carolus-Duran later purchased for his own collection. By 1876, Saint-Marceaux had rented a studio at 68, rue d'Assas, in Paris, close to the Luxembourg Gardens. His studio was down the hall from fellow-artist Charles Degeorge and across the courtyard from the studios of Paul Dubois and Alexandre Falguière; Jules Claretie, a friend of Blanche Butterworth Haggin (1855-1915), described the building as “a genuine city of artists, a nest of sculptors (1876).”

In 1892, Saint-Marceaux married Marguerite Jourdain, the affluent widow of the artist Eugène Bagnies. Marguerite de Saint-Marceaux lived around the corner from Louis Terah Haggin (1847-1929) and Blanche Butterworth Haggin's Paris home, and Madame de Saint-Marceaux kept a busy social calendar. Her parties brought wealthy Parisian society members together with artists and musicians. Jean Béraud (1849-1935) was an old friend; so was Jules Claretie. We cannot know for certain whether the Haggins knew their neighbors the Saint-Marceaux. What we can be sure of is that the sculptor Saint-Marceaux was part of the same community of artists, their friends and critics, and their collectors.

The Haggin's *Harlequin* (1980.7) represents one of Saint-Marceaux' most popular subjects. A marble version of the same statue was exhibited in the Salon of 1880.

Handstitched Worlds: The Cartography of Quilts invites viewers to read quilts as maps, tracing the paths of individual stories and experiences that illuminate larger historic events and cultural trends. Spanning the nineteenth to the twenty-first centuries, the exhibition brings together 18 quilts from the collection of the American Folk Art Museum, New York, representing a range of materials, motifs, and techniques—from traditional early American quilts to more contemporary sculptural assemblage.

PASTELS USA

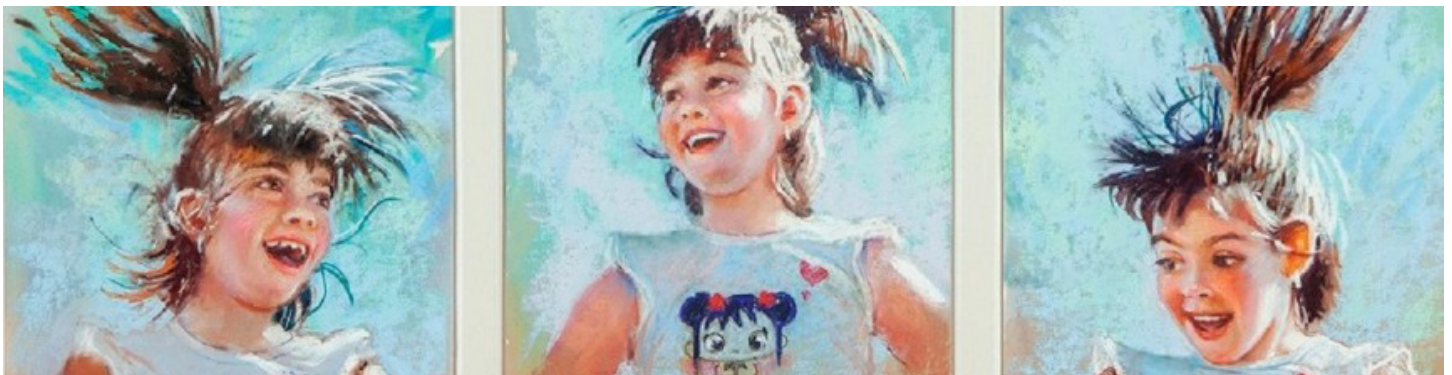


Previously held in such venues as the Triton Museum in Santa Clara, Art Center Morro Bay, and the Hilbert Museum of California at Chapman University, this year the Pastel Society of the West Coast is returning to the Haggin Museum for its 37th Annual Pastels USA: 99 Voices in Pastel international juried exhibition. The show opens on August 31 and runs through October 29, 2023.

An estimated \$12,000 will be awarded among three categories: Modern and Experimental, Contemporary Realism, and Contemporary Impressionism. This highly competitive show attracts internationally known pastel artists, resulting in a stunning collection of award-winning art.

This year's jurors include Mary Platt, Executive Director of the Hilbert Museum of California Art at Chapman University; Marcia Holmes, PSA Master & IAPS Eminent-MC; Tony Allain, Pastel Society UK & Royal Society of Marine Artist, UK, Eminent Pastelist & Member Circle IAPS; Cuong Nguyen, PSA Master Pastelist, Master Circle IAPS, and Distinguished Pastelist PSWC.

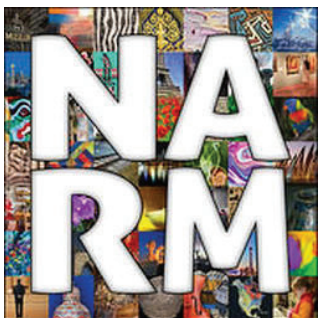
